Highlands North Expanded Neighborhood Patrol News

Welcome to our 83 newest members!
Thank you for your support, everyone!

We had a terrific meeting last on August 26th, and our officers certainly felt appreciated by our community! It was an intimate group, and we were able to discuss many important issues. Several of interest to you may be:

1. **Cars parked the wrong way.** OUR ENP OFFICERS ARE NOT AND HAVE NOT GIVEN THESE TICKETS, but other Dallas officers can and will, so it is best NOT to park the wrong way on any street. It is a violation because when that car pulls away from the curb it is in the DIRECT WAY of oncoming traffic. There have been serious accidents in North Dallas due to parking this way, and several near-misses in Highlands North.
2. **Cul-de-sac parking.** It is not legal to head directly into the curb. Legal parking is sideways, just like on a regular street. Our officers do not ticket for this either, but they warned that the fire department can cite you, as it makes fire and emergency equipment unable to fit in the cul-de-sac.
3. **Alley address signs.** They are very helpful to the police. HNHA used to provide them, but the vendor no longer makes them. The HOA is looking into finding new vendors. If you do not have an alley address, just the street number somewhere on your fence will suffice nicely.
4. **Door-to-door sales.** Never let anyone into your home without proper ID even if they say they are from a utility company. If you do not see a utility vehicle and ID, DO NOT take the risk.

Preston Ridge Trail Update.....

Preston Ridge Trail progress note from a user: I rode my bicycle from Meandering Way & Arapaho (on the Preston Ridge Trail to the Cottonwood Trail) to the DART station on Forest Lane yesterday. The City has now connected the trail underneath the High 5 and one can go all the way to Hamilton Park. A bridge is nearing completion at the DART station on Forest Lane and several workers told me the trail should be completed (meaning "connected to" the White Rock trail) within two months.

Dallas Passes Property Tax Hike

The Dallas City Council passed a new budget Wednesday September 22, 2010 **including a 6.5 percent property tax rate increase**. The final vote came after several hours of speeches from citizens and council members who were sharply divided over the tax rate increase. The final council vote was 8 to 7 in favor of the increase, the same margin that endorsed it in a preliminary vote last week.

New Recycling station has been installed on Richland College campus

Dallas Residents have new location to recycle used cooking oil into biofuel

Dallas Water Utilities and the Dallas County Community College District announced the installation of a cooking grease and oil recycling station at Richland College in northeast Dallas, the second recycling station installed on a DCCCD campus this year. A recycling station was installed at Mountain View College in southwest Dallas in early summer.

The cooking oil and grease recycling program is part of DWU's effort to reduce the number of sewer pipe blockages in a sustainable way. Improper disposal of grease, oil and other cooking byproducts can cause costly clogs in homes and apartments and in sewer lines under city streets. Most of the recycled cooking oil collected under the city program is used to make biodiesel for Dallas County school buses.

Sunshine: More reason to be proud of our neighborhood schools! For the third time in four years, the Richardson Independent School District leads the state in schools named to the Texas Business and Education Coalition (“TBEC”) Honor Roll, sharing the top honor with the Houston ISD. Twenty-two RISD schools were named to the 2010 TBEC Honor Roll, including our neighborhood schools, Bowie Elementary, Parkhill Junior High, J.J. Pearce High School, and Richardson High School. According to TBEC’s Executive Director, the TBEC Honor Roll is the most prestigious award for sustained, academic excellence in Texas. Of the more than 8,000 public schools in Texas, only 252 were named to the TBEC Honor Roll, placing them in the top 4% of public schools in Texas!

IS OUR REPORTED CRIME RATE GOING DOWN??!

It appears as though it may be! The Dallas Police Department online records are not official and often times they will withhold certain crimes or incidents for privacy or investigation reasons; but the records of reported incidents published by the Dallas Police Department and reported to our crime-watch hotline appear to show a downward trend in Highland's North!

We know that we have to keep our guard up, so here are some general crime prevention tips:

GENERAL CRIME PREVENTION TIPS

1. GET TO KNOW YOUR NEIGHBORS

Your neighbors can be your eyes and ears while you are away, and can contact Police if they see suspicious activity while you are away.

2. PHOTOGRAPH & RECORD VALUABLES (including lawn equipment)

Document model and serial numbers on all property - this helps to identify items that may be located by Police.

3. HIRE REPUTABLE LAWN SERVICE PROVIDERS (no transients)

Hire persons that can be identified and located.

4. KEEP GARAGE DOORS CLOSED (even if you are out in your back yard)

Remove temptation from prospective thieves.

5. SECURE HOUSE AND STORAGE BUILDINGS

Protect your valuables with quality locks and doors.

6. DO NOT LEAVE KEYS HIDDEN OUTSIDE YOUR HOME

Leave spare keys with someone you trust, not under the doormat or hidden in a flower pot.

7. DO NOT LEAVE VALUABLES IN YOUR VEHICLE

Laptops, purses, cameras and golf clubs that are visible invite trouble.

8. ALWAYS LOCK HOUSE DOORS, EVEN WHEN IN YOUR YARD

Thieves are aware of your location and may seek an opportunity to enter your home.

9. REPORT SUSPICIOUS PERSONS INCLUDING THOSE KNOCKING ON YOUR DOOR

Burglars have been known to knock on doors to see if anyone is at home.

10. KEEP SHRUBBERY TRIMMED

Unkempt hedges provide concealment for Burglars and Peeping Toms.

11. KEEP YOUR HOUSE WELL LIT - ESPECIALLY AT ENTRANCES

This can deter a criminal if they feel they may be seen.

12. HAVE SOMEONE COLLECT MAIL & NEWSPAPERS WHEN YOU WILL BE AWAY FROM HOME

This common practice is effective to indicate that you are home.

13. USE AUTOMATIC TIMERS ON LIGHTS, RADIOS & TELEVISIONS

Do not advertise that you are not at home.

14. DO NOT LEAVE SPARE KEYS HIDDEN ON OR IN YOUR VEHICLE

Spare keys hidden on or in your vehicle may turn an Auto Break-in into an Auto Theft.

15. NEVER LEAVE AN IDLING VEHICLE UNATTENDED

It only takes a second for someone to steal your car.

16. USE BLINDS AND CURTAINS TO PREVENT SOMEONE FROM LOOKING INTO YOUR HOME

Discourage thieves from seeing what you own and Peeping Toms from seeing you.

Tips on how to be a good neighbor—and avoid lawsuits...

Treating your neighbor as you would like to be treated is wisdom that is thousands of years old. And it may be more important than ever in today's litigious society where a growing number of Americans—nearly 80 percent—live side-by-side in urban and suburban areas, in many cases separated only by a wall.

Between sharing driveways and fences to sharing the beautiful, or not-so-beautiful, sights and sounds of a neighborhood, conflict is bound to happen from time to time when people live next to one another. Excessive noise, pets off their leashes, unmaintained lawns, trespassing, an illegal home business—these represent just some of the most common complaints that can come up between neighbors. When complaints go unresolved, frustration turns into phone calls to the local police or into a lawsuit.

Here are tips from Findlaw.com on how to avoid earning the scorn of your neighbors and being the subject of a lawsuit.

Get to know your neighbors. Learning the basics of why your neighbors choose to live in your neighborhood, what they desire in a great neighborhood, what they do for a living, what they enjoy doing for fun, and even the names of their kids can pay dividends in avoiding conflicts down the road.

Start a neighborhood watch group. Join or form a neighborhood group to watch for unusual or illegal activity in your neighborhood, and to facilitate common ground among your neighbors. Currently, about 200,000 official neighborhood watch programs are registered throughout the U.S.

Courtesy Call. Open communication is an important part of home ownership, and can help prevent future problems with your neighbors. If you are planning a major landscape or remodeling project, let your neighbor know in advance. And if you're going to have a party that could create some noise, don't just tell your neighbors about it; invite them.

Maintain your property. Think about the way your property affects your neighbors and imagine the view from their side of the fence. Many neighborhood associations and cities maintain covenants or have regulations about property maintenance. Not adhering to these standards can get you in hot water.

Respect property lines. Check all local community laws before landscaping, adding a fence or tree, or launching a remodeling project, such as adding onto your home. If you're building or landscaping near the property line, make sure you're in compliance with local codes. If you share a property line, such as a shared driveway, work closely with your neighbor to find solutions that work for both of you.

Fences. Fences make for good neighbors, but sure that before you build one, you follow local codes regulating the height, location, material used and appearance of a fence. A neighbor can only remove another's fence if it poses a danger to those

who interact with it. If it is a property-line fence, neighbors have equal share in the future of the fence and must agree in remodeling it. This also means that both neighbors are responsible for maintenance of the fence and need to split all costs for the preservation.

Trees. The tree owner is responsible for the maintenance of the tree and any damage if the tree falls on a neighbor's lawn or house. If a thunderstorm or other natural disaster forces a tree to cause damage, then the tree owner is no longer responsible. Neighbors are able to trim others' tree branches; however, if they harm the tree, they could be sued for up to \$2,500.

Keep pets in control. Pets are free to roam on their owner's property if they have a fence set up, but if the animals escape and cause damage, it is the pet owner's full responsibility. Most neighborhoods and parks have leash laws and require owners to clean up after their pets. Pet owners will also be responsible if their pet bites or harms another person. If a neighbor has too many pets, then they could be violating a zoning health code or noise ordinance.

Seek mediation. Filing a lawsuit should always be the last resort. Before you get there, speak with your neighbor about the problem. If that doesn't work, seek mediation, which many cities and neighborhood councils now have. Mediation can help neighbors address a problem and still preserve long-term relationships with your neighbor.

Timely Tip for October Gardeners from Calloway's Nursery: Fresh Fall Color

Transform the appearance of your landscape with fresh, colorful blooms. Blooming Garden Mums offer a wide range of instant Fall color. Choose plants which are just showing color and you will enjoy them longer. Select an area that gets at least six hours of sun a day. Dianthus (also known as "Pinks"), Snapdragons, Cyclamen, Violas and the fragrant Alyssum are also good choices for cooler weather annuals. Ornamental Cabbage and Kale provide striking foliage forms in the landscape as well as colorful foliage. For best effect, limit your plantings to two or three colors per bed.

The key to growing beautiful annual flowers is soil preparation. Select a well drained flowerbed and add lots of organic matter. **Calloway's Flower Bed Mix**, contains compost plus a boost of fertilizer, water-management crystals and a wetting agent. Coyote Sightings & Warnings

Over the last year, there have been several coyote sightings and the unfortunate reports of missing cats. In the last month, there have been many articles and segments in and on the news about the growing coyote population in suburban/residential areas in Dallas, TX.

Most coyotes are timid animals. When living around humans, who provide them ample food resources, either intentionally or unintentionally, they can exhibit a gradual escalation of aggressive or predatory behaviors prior, which can lead to attacks or pets and on people.

Please be vigilant about keeping your small pets inside after dark and in the early morning hours (before dusk). If you encounter a coyote, try to scare it off. Allowing a coyote to become more familiar around humans only increases their comfort level of staying put.

From the Dallas Animal Services Website: Wildlife Information

Dallas is home to many different species of wild animals. Although none pose a significant threat to their human neighbors. These animals include [armadillos](#), bats, [bobcats](#), [coyotes](#), [foxes](#), opossums, [skunks](#) and others.

Tips to keeping a wild animal from taking up residence in your yard or attic:

1. Close all trash containers
2. If you feed your pet outside remove any remaining food before nightfall
3. Store compost in proper containers
4. Keep weeds and grass cut short especially near fences or walls
5. Ensure wood piles are stored in proper bins
6. Ensure your roof and eaves are in good condition, even small holes need to be covered.
7. Cap your chimney, and cover all vents with a commercial product or a wire mesh to keep animals from nesting
8. Keep your garage doors closed in the evenings.
